The ACT Uganda and ACT US partnership is one of support and solidarity, with the Ugandan partners leading the generation of ideas, development and evaluation of programs, and generation of resources.

History of ACT Uganda

ACT, formed in 2003, strives to improve the lives of the impoverished rural people in Muko Sub-County located in southwestern Uganda. ACT has grown from a small community-based organization working in Uganda to an international partnership which exists primarily on proceeds from handcraft sales, donations from caring individuals, and grants from our supporting churches and other organizations. ACT is organized as two registered nongovernmental organizations (one in Uganda and one in Michigan), but operates with collaboration between the Boards of Directors in each nation, six paid staff in Uganda, and more than 250 volunteers in Uganda and the U.S. If you are interested in helping us make a difference by making a monetary donation, please know that your tax deductible gift will be used to create a bright and self-sustaining future for many lives. 20th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION!

2023 marks 20 years since Generous and Richard Turinawe, along with Sue and John Waechter, started the adventure that you now know as ACT (Agape Community Transformation) Uganda. Twenty years later things have grown from working to obtain an ambulance back in 2003, to six active programs covering music, agriculture, education, employment, health care, and more. These programs are managed by six paid staff members in Uganda and supported by dozens of volunteers there and in Michigan. To celebrate this milestone, there were three successful fundraising events. Two dinners in Michigan (Midland and Traverse City) and one event Muko, Uganda.

In Michigan, these dinners were attended by over 150 people. The donations raised are being used by our FUNDS Task Force. At the dinners, attendees enjoyed an Africaninspired dinner, heard from our Ugandan partners via video, and learned about the progress in each of the programs of ACT. They also had the opportunity to participate in a silent auction for some lovely gifts provided by local business and ACT Board Members.

At the celebration in Muko, there were at least 600 people and the ceremonies lasted about 2.5 hours with music and dancing and speeches. It was wonderful. ACT is very well-known and appreciated throughout the whole Rubanda District. John and Sue spent a week in Muko to celebrate this occasion with the Ugandan staff and the Muko Sub-County community. Generous and Sue were able to keep the Waechter's visit a complete

No agenda, Guma! Just here to be with you as you celebrate 20 glorious years of serving Muko! It felt like a bookend for John and Sue because the very first trip in 2006 was just the two of them meeting with Generous and Richard and now 20 years later...



FUNDS TASK FORCE:

Financial Ugandan Needs for Development & Sustainability

We chartered the FUNDS Task Force in February, 2020 with the goal of proposing new models of sustainability for ACT Uganda (e.g., "social business").

The Task Force is comprised of U.S. and Ugandan members. They have been studying potential ways to bring revenue to ACT outside of donations and grants. The focus in the last couple of years, was a hardware store. It opened in 2022 and has made a small profit every month of operation - a real success compared to most start-up social businesses. This group is continuing to look at potential new and viable businesses.

Facilities

In 2023 all of the buildings on the ACT Resource Center (ARC) grounds were repaired and painted. Wiring was upgraded in the main building, and ceilings were installed in three rooms. The typical ceiling construction in Uganda is using concrete. Due to the excessive span in one room, that ceiling collapsed, fortunately with no injuries. A review of that failure and the other newly installed ceilings is underway, and repairs will be made in early 2024.

We reduced the number of motorcycles at the ARC from four to two and used the proceeds from the sale to repair the two remaining motorcycles. These provide the means for the staff to travel within Muko-Sub-County.

At one of our 20-year celebrations, the ACT Resource Center was renamed the Turinawe-Waechter ACT Resource Center in honor of the two founders and Directors of ACT Uganda and ACT US, as well as celebrating ACT's 20 years in existence.

Communications/Resource Development

The Communications and Resource Development Teams worked together closely to continue sharing our story and securing the needed funding to ensure ACT's path forward. These teams are comprised of many dedicated volunteers, but are always open to new ideas and members. They played a significant role in the success of the 20th Anniversary Celebrations.

HANDS: Helping Agricultural New Development and Sustainability



This year the HANDS staff, working with community-based trainers, provided 390 people with permagarden and nutrition

training (photo above), bringing the total to 720 residents who have received this training. Trainees were given carrot and spinach seeds to incorporate into their gardens, with 70% of the trainees successfully tending them, and creating a ready source of healthy vegetables, even while dealing with water management issues due to extended dry spells and torrential downpours. HANDS also provided nutrition and iron-rich bean agronomy training for 70 people and provided trainees with 2 kg of iron-rich bean seeds to plant. After harvest, a portion of the seeds were returned to ACT, making it the first time that more seed was returned than was given out. Late in 2023, HANDS acquired capability for noninvasive hemoglobin testing which will help assess the prevalence of anemia in the region and identify candidates for nutrition and permagarden training. HANDS staff, along with Muko Sub-County youth, attended a Peace Corps "Youth Entrepreneurship Training" event. Multiple topics were addressed covering entrepreneurship, financial literacy, and more. Several U.S.produced weeding tools, that could significantly reduce labor for farmers, were received in Muko in December. If these tools are viewed favorably, they could be made in Uganda. The HANDS programs were supported by a grant from the Allen Foundation, Midland, Michigan.

HEAL: Health is Elemental to All Life

HEAL works to reduce morbidity and mortality among the population in Muko Sub-County by addressing key health impact outcomes, improving health literacy, and reducing health disparities within its population. In 2023, HEAL education efforts reached higher numbers of people in the community than

ever before. Health education in the form of theatrical dramas (photo at right) attracted large crowds and



covered key topics like hygiene, alcoholism, and domestic violence. Although this approach was well-received it was expensive, and it was determined that their impact was not large enough to justify the high costs.

In the Fall 2023, a new initiative of a journal club discussion, led by Robin Stottlemyer in Michigan, began meeting monthly over Zoom. In Journal Club, Muko High School students and teachers who are interested in science, join ACT staff and U.S. volunteers to discuss a research paper relevant to Ugandan public health. The club focuses on developing critical thinking skills related to science and health literacy, and operates at almost no cost, but has been instrumental in guiding current and future leaders of this rural community toward improved information-seeking behavior. It is so popular that students volunteered to walk many miles over holiday break so they could attend a session over ZOOM. As a result, we are optimistic about the future of HEAL as ACT works to develop new data-driven outreach and education initiatives.



MUSIC: Muko Uganda String Instruments for Children

In 2023, two of our High School MUSIC achievers led the classes at Muko High School while we looked for a new teacher for MUSIC. Norbert Aharizira and Brave Ainamani worked very hard via weekly Zoom meetings, from January to July, learning violin, viola, and cello, and leading the students. In July a search was conducted to find a teacher, and Ugandan staff recommended we rehire Howard Biryomuriwe, our first teacher. Howard returned on November 1st and was available to conduct the 20th Anniversary Celebration performances.

Muko has over 90 violins and violas, 4 cellos, and some auxiliary instruments like guitar, piano, and accordions. Many African instruments were purchased and are also available for students' use. Two camps were held which provided the best intensive work for the students. Students attend camps during school breaks for about one week, staying at Muko High School and practicing and rehearsing together all day. Funds are continually needed for instrument repair, and replacement, camps, and supplies.

HONOR: Hope, Opportunity, Need, Ownership, Respect

Because of our generous donors, 197 students, who otherwise might not have received a quality education in 2023, had that chance. The goal of providing this opportunity was one of the original purposes of ACT Uganda and continues to

be a high priority. We sincerely thank our donors, as well as those students who work hard to obtain and keep these scholarships.

Unfortunately, we had to say Good-Bye to Karen Viele upon her retirement from leading this program for many, many years. Her contributions were invaluable and her leadership will be missed!

MAVERICK Leadership Scholarships

This Scholarship is provided to exceptional students who are interested in becoming leaders and in 2023, 2 students benefitted from it. We also learned in 2023 that one of our "graduated" Maverick Scholars was one of three Ugandan students who was awarded another highly competitive scholarship, offered by a separate organization, to study a Joint Master of Science in Limnology and Wetland Management that is jointly taught by three Universities in Austria, Netherlands and Kenya. This leadership and initiative is exactly what was dreamed of when this Maverick Scholarship was initiated.



TEACH: Targeting Educational Advancement of Children

Enrollment at Muko High School (MHS) increased to over 600 students. Given that the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between ACT and the Diocese of Kigezi ends in December 2024, the TEACH team was sunset at the end of 2023. Dave Viele, TEACH Team Leader in the U.S., will monitor MHS administration activities in 2024, but not be heavily involved. The majority of administration will be handled by MHS staff as they utilize the training they received on budgeting and financial recordkeeping over the course of the MOU. With the current enrollment, MHS should have adequate resources to manage all aspects and plan for additional physical improvements.



The Science Lab Nearly Completed

The Science Lab construction is nearly completed and the building is in use, although not all the desired equipment is available yet. Tiling the entire interior is planned for early 2024.

Uniquely Ugandan Handcrafts

Uniquely Ugandan Handcrafts had an outstanding year of sales in 2023. Sales venues included many of our supporting churches and synods, as well as local art fairs, and family events. Additionally, special orders were fulfilled, and the ACT online store received several orders. These combined sales brought in over \$12,000, providing undesignated revenue to support new projects and cover administrative costs.
